Description

During the Railroad Era (1870-1914) in White County a variety of vernacular houses were constructed. They were also built out of a variety of materials. Surviving examples from this period, however, are somewhat limited. The Hassell House is a good example of a one and one-half story irregularly-shaped building that is constructed of load-bearing brick, and has a hip roof that slopes downward to gable roof wings. The roof is clad with composition shingles and the entire structure rests on a brick foundation.

Located on the southwest corner of S. Elm Street and W. Woodruff Avenue, this building was constructed about six blocks southwest of the court square in Searcy. The Hassell House was constructed c. 1910, and is in fair condition. Its main, or north, elevation is dominated by a one-story porch that wraps around to the east elevation of the house. The porch roof is supported by Doric columns. Porch access from the house is provided by single asymmetrically placed doors on both the north and east elevations of the structure. The eastern entrance is skewed.

Ground floor fenestration on these elevations consists of symmetrically placed one-over-one single-hung sash windows. All upper portions of the gable ends, with one exception, are decorated with imbricated wooden shingles and fenestrated with one-over-one double-hung sash windows; louvered vents are found just above the upper sash of the windows. The lone exception is located on the south elevation of the structure. This gable end has imbricated shingles just like the others but its lone window is a single-pane fixed frame version. The western elevation of the structure is adorned with a chamfered bay that is relieved by a centrally placed one-over-one double-hung sash window and a single door one its northern edge.

A gable roof wing protrudes from the southwest comer of the house. Its western elevation is fenestrated with a centrally placed paired one-over-one double-hung sash window. The only addition to the building is attached to the east side of this wing and extends almost the full length of the south elevation. Fenestration consists of centrally placed one-over-one double-hung sash ribbon windows found on the east side of the addition. A single centrally placed door enters the south elevation of this room. A porch once extended from the western side of the addition almost all of the way to the center of the rear gable wing; the eastern half of this porch has since been enclosed. The ground floor of the gable wing found on the east elevation of the structure is fenestrated with a single centrally placed one-over-one double-hung sash window.

Significance

When this building was constructed, c. 1910, brick houses were not very numerous in White County. Surviving examples are even rarer today. In fact, only six remain in the entire county that date to the Railroad Era (1870-1914). This house remains as a rare example of a large-scale brick house. Because of this the Hassell House is significant; it can provide insight into construction techniques and living arrangements of this era. Hence its eligibility under Criterion C with local significance.
