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#### Description

The Bell House is a single story, structural brick wall Craftsman residence. The various intersecting gable roof elements lend the plan an irregular form. A single interior brick chimney rises from inside the eastern carport at the southern end of the main house gable. The entire structure is roofed with composition shingles, the walls are sheathed with brick and stucco, and the continuous foundation is formed from cast concrete.

The southern or front elevation is composed of a side gable porch which adjoins a smaller gable end at the western end and the gable end of the main house which sits directly behind and rises above it. The western gable end is lighted with a central three-over-one wood sash window and also displays a stuccoed pediment with a louvered central vent. A central vent is also placed in the peak of the stuccoed pediment of the main house gable. The porch is supported on five squat, sloping wood columns which in turn rest upon brick pedestals. A solid brick balustrade connects the pedestals and terminates at the two entrance stairways. Beneath the porch an entrance punctuates the house wall just beyond the stairway and a four-over-one wood sash window lights the wall to the east. Another entrance provides access to the house at the back of the recessed porch to the east.

The eastern elevation features the gable pediment and columns of the porch to the south and the side wall of the house to the north. Two sash windows flank the chimney beneath the porch and two pairs of four-over-one wood sash windows light the side wall, which is finished with a single wood sash window. The western elevation is similar, with two pairs of wood sash windows symmetrically placed in the wall and flanking a central sash window.

The northern elevation is relieved only by a group of three sash windows centrally placed in the gable end of the projecting eastern wing.

The Bell House in intact and unaltered. It is in good condition.

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Significance Criterion C, local significance

The Bell House (Part E, Historic Context #4) is the best example in this neighborhood of Searcy of a single story, structural brick wall Craftsman style residence. Its squat wood columns, multimedia wall cladding and extremely irregular plan reveal the influence of high-style Craftsman designs. As such, the Bell House, in addition to its obvious merits as a Craftsman design, stands as a particularly good example of the first phase of the evolution of Craftsman house design in White County, when the aesthetic was still relatively new and the resulting designs drew more directly from the design ethos which stressed rambling, functional plans, picturesque elevations of various indigenous materials, and low, spreading eaves which emphasized the design's site and inevitable relationship with the earth.
