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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Cooper House on Front Street is the most architecturally interesting house in Dardanelle, a small port city on the Arkansas River. According to local tradition the architecture of this late nineteenth century house was inspired by river steamers, and in some ways it does resemble a grounded steamboat. The bay windows and porch protrusions on either side of the entry resemble steamboat prows. The second storey facade has three small balconies centered over the entry and each bay. These flat roofed balconies are reminiscent of captain's bridges. A third "steamboat style" feature is found in the two round windows which flank the center balcony. These circular windows resemble portholes, thus adding a final touch to the nautical effect of the house.

The basic floor plan of the Cooper House is ell shape with the east facade across the long leg of the ell. The front portion of the house is two stories high while the rear extension is only one and one-half stories. About 1940 a one storey addition, enclosing part of the original back porch, was made at the rear of the house. At the same time a screened porch was added to the south elevation of the front portion of the house. A cross gable roof with several gabled dormers covers the white frame structure.

The most interesting features of the Cooper House are displayed on the facade. A one storey flat roofed porch extends across the facade, protruding on either side of the main entry. The porch cornice has pointed dentils and a row of spindle work below the frieze. Ornamental brackets are paired at each angle of the irregularly shaped porch.

A double door entry and two bay windows are covered by the porch. Each three sided bay has three separate windows, with the center window almost twice as wide as the narrower side windows. A transom-like light surrounded by colored glass fills the top of each center window. Pilasters similar to the turned porch posts and horizontal panelling under each window further decorate the bays.

The second storey features three small balconies centered over the downstairs entry and bay windows. Except for a plain railing over crossed strips of wood, these balconies are trimmed much like the porch below. The door opening onto each balcony contains small square and rectangular lights of colored glass surrounding a clear pane. Circular windows with stained glass separate the three balconies.

From the irregular roof line of the house project eight gables, seven of which are trimmed with bargeboard and spindlework in the gable ends. Exterior window and door surrounds are uniformly plain.

The ornate trim on the exterior of the Cooper House is repeated to a lesser extent on the interior. The central hallway is lined with narrowly panelled rm No. 10-300a av. 10-74)

wainscot. Decorative features on the curved stairway include turned balusters, a round panelled newel post and scroll cut woodwork trim. Wide grooved woodwork is used in baseboards and window and door surrounds.

The Cooper House rests on a corner lot facing the Arkansas River. Still in very good condition, it displays the skill of the unknown carpenter/ craftsman who fashioned the house in the 1890's.

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TATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Cooper House in Dardanelle, Arkansas displays an architectural style described by local residents as "steamboat Gothic." The facade does indeed have several features reminiscent of a steamboat, including prow-like protrusions of the first floor window bays and porch, and captain's bridge balconies and porthole round windows on the second storey. The multi-gabled roof and the porch trim of spindle work and scroll cut brackets give the house its Victorian Gothic appearance.

The existence of several structures apparently built about the same time and with features similar to the Cooper House indicates that a single highly skilled craftsman was responsible for a number of houses in Dardanelle. The Cooper House is the most architecturally impressive house in the area and is an important local landmark.

In 1889 John C. Brooks bought lots one and three in Brearly's Addition of Dardanelle, the lots on which the Cooper House now stands. Mr. Brooks probably built the present house soon after he purchased the river front property.

The 1880 census lists John C. Brooks as a thirty-five year old farmer with a wife and five children; however, the present owner of the Cooper House states that in the 1890's Brooks owned and operated a sawmill. This would have greatly facilitated the construction of any house, but especially a house as heavily decorated with woodwork as the Cooper House.

In 1905 Brooks sold the property to E. A. Jones for \$1,000.00. Three years later the property again changed hands when Jones sold it to Joe T. Bray, owner of .a buggy and saddle shop. The Bray family retained the house till mid-century, and during their ownership the house received its only major alterations. In the 1940's a screened porch was added to the south elevation and a one storey room was added to the rear of the house.

This architecturally interesting house has a quaint charm expressed through its unusual combination of architectural features. The small proportions of the house give it a cottage-like quality found rarely in an Arkansas house of this period. Its "steamboat Gothic" style is reminiscent of the era in which the Cooper-House was built - - an era when Dardanelle was an active river port for steamboats on the Arkansas River. · . . .

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

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
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
