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Description:

The Crossett Experimental Forest Complex is located south of Crossett on Arkansas Highway 133 roughly one-and-one-half miles north of the Louisiana State line. Building No. 8 is a plain, frame structure with a rectangular plan and is one-and-one-half storys in height. The eastern elevation has a one bay, central front porch covered with a gabled roof which intersects with the gabled roof of the main structure. The eastern view also has four double-hung windows with a six-over-six pane arrangement and a small louvered vent in the pediment over the porch. The northern elevation has two six-over-six windows on the first floor and one six-over-six window on the second floor. Also along the northern view is a rear "L" which has a single door covered by a stoop. The western elevation features some diversity in the window arrangement: four different types of six-over-six windows including one double window in the center of the house. The rear "L" has a gabled roof which connects with the rear portion of the main roof line halfway up the gable and a few feet south of the northern elevation. The southern elevation is rather plain with two six-over-six windows on the first floor and one smaller six-over-six window on the second floor. The house has an interior chimney which is located at the intersection of the gables of the main roof line and the gable of the porch. The roof is covered with composition shingles and the walls are covered with novelty siding. The house is in good condition.

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The Crossett Experimental Forest Building #8 was constructed circa 1940 by members of the 768th Company of the Arkansas CCC District stationed at the Oden Camp that was located at Oden, in northwestern Montgomery County, though it was later moved further northwest to Buck Knob. It was constructed as part of the administrative headquarters for the Southern Experimental Forest of the Ouachita National Forest (ONF). This building was one of the office buildings for the Experimental Forest, and it continues to serve that purpose today. As such, the Crossett Experimental Forest Building #8 remains significant through its associations with the significant contributions to American social history made by the Civilian Conservation Corps and for its associations with the conservation movement that President Roosevelt intended this organization to serve, particularly within such protected federal lands as the national forests.



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
