SUMMARY

Crossroads Fire Tower is located on SR 133 North a short distance north of the Ashley County Road 12 and SR 133 intersection. This area is known as Crossroads. The fire tower is easily visible from SR 133. The Hamburg Rural Water tower was erected northeast of the fire tower after the city purchased the land in 2000.

ELABORATION

The fire tower was constructed by the Aermotor Company and erected by the Civilian Conservation Corps and stands 120 feet tall. It is the tallest tower of its type remaining in the state of Arkansas. The areas surrounding the fire tower are flat necessitating the height of this tower. The structure itself is typical construction during this period. It consists of a braced galvanized metal frame supporting the enclosed observation structure from which the operator could view the surrounding landscape in all directions. Each of the four walls consists of eighteen adjustable windowpanes for unobstructed viewing. The window units can open or close for ventilation or warmth. The tin cab is at least 7' x 7' with a hip roof. The steps are located in the center of the tower and are constructed of galvanized steel with wooden treads. The landings at the bottom of each set of stairs are wooden.

Between 1936 and 1943 an additional twenty feet was added to the tower to achieve a more clear view over surrounding trees. The additional twenty feet altered the original tower design because the addition kept it from tapering from bottom to top. The tower now tapers out before tapering inward again where the additional twenty feet was added.

INTEGRITY

Crossroads Fire Tower is still standing in stable condition. It is in need of repair to restore it to its original condition. Years of weathering and vandalism have contributed to its present state. The fire tower is enclosed with a security fence to deter vandalism. All of the original materials remain in place. The steel structure of the tower is in very good condition; however, the wooden steps and landings have begun to deteriorate and the cab will need to have new windows. Overall the tower remains a solid presence in the Hamburg skyline and is a landmark of its time.

SUMMARY

Crossroads Fire Tower is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with **local significance** under **Criterion A** for its association with the emphasis upon conservation of the abundance of natural resources in this area. This was also the original mandate of the Civilian Conservation Corps. It is also being nominated under **Criterion C** as a good example of a fire tower built by the Civilian Conservation Corps. This nomination is also being submitted under the multiple property context of "Facilities Constructed by the CCC in Arkansas, 1933-1942."

ELABORATION

This property is considered a part of the Timberlands and is located in Ashley County, Arkansas. Ashley County is in the Southeast corner of Arkansas on the Arkansas-Louisiana border. Ashley County was organized November 30, 1848 and consists of 921 square miles. It was the fifty-third county to be formed in Arkansas and is the fifth largest county in the state with a population of 23,583 according to the as of 2003. Ashley County was formed from part of Drew County with final boundary adjustments made in 1861. It was named for U.S. Senator Chester Ashley. Wilderness provides an abundance of forestry, hunting, fishing, camping, boating and canoeing opportunities. Bayou Bartholomew, the longest bayou in the United States runs through the county. Felsenthal National Wildlife Refuge has the world's largest green-tree reservoir consisting of 15,000 acres and is more than doubled to 36,000 acres during the winter flooding. Established in 1970 and containing 65,000 acres, this refuge is located in Ashley, Bradley and Union Counties. Today, Ashley County's main communities are Crossett, Hamburg, Fountain Hill, Montrose, Parkdale, Portland and Wilmot.

As of 1930, Arkansas was one of the largest timber producing states in the nation. At this time it was the only state that did not have a forestry department, which resulted in forest fire protection problems. It was the responsibility of lumber company owners to protect the forests. The 1931 session of the Arkansas Legislature passed Act 234 creating the State Forestry Commission. One of the statutory responsibilities of this commission was to cooperate with timber owners in the prevention and suppression of forest fires. The commission was broken down into units. In the beginning, Curtis Coffman was in charge of Unit 1 with headquarters at Hamburg. By June 30, 1934, the Commission had about 2.5 million acres under intensive protection from fire, all of which was in Southern Arkansas. Fire protection was the first consideration for successful management of the forest. This could not have come sooner for the local saw mill known as Crossett Lumber Company which opened in 1902 and today is Georgia Pacific.

The State Forestry Commission chose a location known as Crossroads to erect a fire tower. The Aeromotor Company built the fire tower, which was brought from Enid, Oklahoma. After arriving in Hamburg the fire tower was erected by the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC). The CCC was formed from Franklin D. Roosevelt's program designed to help the national economy and preserve natural resources. There were more than 500,000 men in this program nationally at its peak. About one half of

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those men were responsible for forest service projects. In total, they erected 3,100 fire towers. During this time in Ashley County, there was a 200-man camp initially established east of Crossett but later moved to Hamburg. This camp was responsible for erecting the Crossroads Fire Tower.

Forest fires were common during the spring fire season, which extended from mid-February until the grass and other vegetation turned green and the fall fire season lasting from about October 1st until the winter rains started in December.

Crossroads Fire Tower was opened in 1935. The concrete corner bases of the tower have the year 1926 etched on them. The concrete step base has the date September 23, 1926. We have been unable to connect the year etched on these bases with the year that we have that the tower opened in 1935. In the early days of operation, a house was built on the same property as the fire tower to house the fire tower operator. This house was located almost exactly where Hamburg Rural Water tower is now located. The Crossroads Fire Tower served as a lookout tower from 1935 until the time it was closed in 1985. Many towers including Crossroads were phased out in favor of aerial fire detection. Today there are only twenty remaining fire towers of the 105 that the state once had.

During the time of operation the operators were: Tucker, John D. 1935-1943, Kinnaird, Mack L. 1943-1943, McLemore, Richard 1944-1952, High, J.E. 1952-1953, Kinnaird, Mack 1953-1964, Anthony, Mr. 1964-1966, Jones, R. Faye 1966-1975, and Rauls, Glendine 1975-1985.
