DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

In 1893 Dr. Dewell Gann, Sr. built a three room building in Benton, Arkansas for his office. The building, constructed of sawn bauxite blocks which were mined in the Benton area, rests on a granite foundation. Patients who were unable to pay for professional services rendered them by Dr. Gann supplied the labor to construct the office.

A distinguishing feature of the building is it five gable roof which is a product of the Gothic Revival and High Victorian style of architecture. The gables are decorated with wooden imbrication and brackets with pendants. Small ornate brackets also decorate the cornice.

The front elevation is perfectly symmetrical. The porch is supported by three slender turned columns with brackets to each side and has a serpentine-like staw cut frieze. Centered in the twin front gables are small round three-section windows of stained glass. Symmetrically placed, ornately milled front doors feature segmental arched windows with alternating border panes of frosted, blue, and purple glass set in wooden mullions. The criginal patterned brass door knob and escutcheon plate remains on one of the front doors. The top sections of the windows centered between the doors also have stained glass borders of red, yellow, and green glass.

The two identical front waiting rooms (one for women and the other for men) are connected by a plain arched doorway and have ceilings of ornate pressed tin. Each room has a separate entry to the examining room at the rear of the building. Beaded woodwork surrounds the doors and windows. The window aprons are unusual in that they have mitered corners and are a continuation of the same pattern as that of the window and door trim. Machine carved floral designs decorate the corner blocks and their crowns. Turned spindle-like designs are applied to the plenth blocks.

In 1946, Dr. Dewell Gann, Jr. gave the building to the City of Benton as a library. At that time the original slate roof was replaced with asphalt shingles and the cresting along the ridge of the roof was removed. A 25' X 45' concrete block addition was added to the rear as a reading room. This addition changed the floor plan of the building from T-shape to rectangular. The base of the T was absorbed into the addition but the original exterior rear doorway and window of the building are still intact as is the exterior bauxite walls of the rear room. Through the years window guards have been added and wire mesh has been installed behind the glass in the front doors. Also the original three-color scheme as evidenced in a photograph taken in the 1890's has been covered by white paint.

ATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Gann Building, the only bauxite building known to be in existence, was built in 1893 for the office of Dr. Dewell Gann, Sr. by patients who could not afford to pay for services he had rendered them. The soft stone used in the construction was dug from the ground of a farm nearby, sawn into blocks with a handsaw and allowed to harden for six weeks.

Dr. Gann, Sr., born March 31, 1859 in Atlanta, Georgia, graduated from Emory University in 1886. After studying in New York briefly, he came west to Sheridan, Arkansas where he began the practice of medicine with B. W. Mason. In 1889 he married Martha Harding Whitthorne. The following year the couple moved to Benton, Arkansas. After establishing a successful medical practice in Benton, Dr. Gann helped to organize the first Saline County Medical Society.

On September 14, 1890, Dr. Dewell Gann's only son, Dewell Gann, Jr., was born. Following his father's profession he graduated from Indiana University in 1913 with his medical doctorate degree. He then returned to Arkansas to join his father's practice. An extremely learned man, Dr. Gann, Jr. introduced the therapeutic use of radium into Arkansas in 1916. From 1919 until 1924 he was attending surgeon at Little Rock General Hospital. During this time he invented a new resusciator which helped to restore circulation as well as respiration in asphyxia or drowning. In 1925 he was chosen Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons of Edinburgh. This honor had been given to less than ten men in the entire United States at the time it was presented to Dr. Gann, Jr.

In 1946 the Gann Office was given to the City of Benton to be used as a library. At this time an addition was built onto the rear of the building and shelving was installed for the books. The building remained a library until 1967 when a larger facility was obtained. At this time the building was designated by the city to be used as a museum for the City of Benton and for Saline County.





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

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
