SUMMARY

The Otis Theodore and Effiegene Locke Wingo House was originally constructed in 1904, as a one-story, five bedroom wood frame, weatherboard home in the Queen Anne style. The house is supported by brick piers, and features a complex, multi cross-gabled roof. At an unknown date, probably in the 1920s, a Craftsman style porch, with wood-over-concrete-over-brick square columns, replaced the original porch. Also, a half-story was added to the rear of the house and a one-car detached garage may have been added at the same time. At an unknown date, a shed-roof extension across the entire rear of the house was added. Written on the sidewalk located in front of the house is the name, "Otis T. Wingo."

ELABORATION

Front/South Façade

The weatherboard clad front façade, facing south, is defined by a bay projection on the western section and a d-roof wrap around porch on the center and eastern sections. Tall, one-over-one wooden windows fenestrate each side of the bay. The cross-gable roof extends out over the bay sides and roof corners are decorated by decorative pendants. A wood louvered vent is located in the gable end.

Moving east along the front façade, a shed-roof wrap around porch begins flush against the cross-gabled bay projection. Two doors are located on the front façade. An etched glass and wooden door is located on the eastern side of the bay projection. Next to that bay door is the front entrance; a plain glass and wooden door that is located on the south façade. Next to the front entrance, is a tall, one-over-one wooden window. The shed-roof wrap around porch on the south façade is supported by three wood-over-concrete-over-brick square columns and stucco railing.

Side/East Façade

The weatherboard clad east façade is defined by the shed-roof wrap around porch and the side of the shedroof rear extension. Moving south to north, the east façade is fenestrated by a tall, one-over-one wooden window and a door. The north side of the rear extension is fenestrated by one short, two-over-two aluminum window. The stucco railing continues on the east side of the shed-roofed wrap around porch. The weatherboard clad east side of the rear extension is without details.

Rear/North Façade

The original rear of the house has been altered with the current shed-roof rear extension. The rear extension was added at an unknown date to make room for a utility room and add space to modernize the kitchen. This rear extension covers the original house well. The weatherboard clad rear of the building, facing north, is fenestrated with one two-over-two aluminum window, an aluminum door with five concrete steps and metal railing leading up to the door, a two-over-two aluminum window and another aluminum door with three concrete steps leading up to the door, located east to west along the north façade. It appears that a second story addition was added to the rear of the house when the Craftsman style porch replaced the original porch. The second story addition contains a one-over-one wooden window on the east side and four one-over-one wooden windows on the north side.

Side/West Façade

The west façade is irregular in shape. The rear shed-roof extension extends slightly out from the original part of the house. Two-over-two aluminum windows fenestrate the southwest corner of the rear extension. The middle of this façade is marked by a protruding cross-gable room. Between the rear extension and the protruding room are two aluminum framed windows. It appears that these windows replaced an original wooden frame window. The west and south sides of the protruding cross-gabled room are fenestrated by tall, one-over-one wooden windows. South of the protruding cross-gabled room is another tall, one-over-one wooden window.

Garage

A rectangular, detached, vertical board clad single-car garage sits at the rear of the house. The garage entrance faces south. Two small windows are located on the back wall. The exposed rafters of the gable roof suggest that the garage was built around the time the Craftsman style porch replaced the original porch on the main house.

SUMMARY

The Otis Theodore and Effiegene Locke Wingo House is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with statewide significance under Criterion B for its association with United States Representatives Otis Theodore and Effiegene Locke Wingo. Otis represented the Fourth District in Arkansas from 1913 until his death in 1930. Effiegene filled the vacancy caused by her husband's death, and served until 1933.

ELABORATION

Otis Theodore Wingo was born in Weakley County, Tennessee, on June 18, 1877, to Theodore Freelinghuysen and Pauline Elizabeth Jane (Johnson) Wingo. He attended Bethel College at McKenzie, Thessee; McFerrin College at Martin, Tennessee; and Valparaiso University in Indiana. After college, Otis In school while he studied law. In 1900, he was admitted to the bar, moved to De Queen, Sevier County, Arkansas, and commenced his law practice. On October 15, 1902, Otis married Effiegene Locke. They moved into their new home in 1904. They had two children, Blanche and Otis T. Wingo, Jr.

Otis served as a member of the Arkansas State Senate from 1907 to 1909. After his term as a state senator, he returned to his practice in De Queen. On March 4, 1913, Otis was elected as a Democrat to the United States Sixty-third Congress to represent the Fourth District in Arkansas, the first Representative from DeQueen. Two of Otis's projects resulted in the extension of rural mail service and the setting aside of land for the Ouachita National Forest. He was the author of the Wingo Corporation Act and the legislation that created Teacher's Normal Training Schools in Arkansas. He also wrote the resolution that investigated fraudulent spending on the new Arkansas State Capitol (NR 6/28/74). He was the senior Democrat of the Banking and Currency Commission in the House of Representatives. He served as a US Representative until his death in Baltimore, Maryland, on October 21, 1930.

Effiegene Locke Wingo is the great-great-great-granddaughter of Matthew Locke. Matthew Locke was a Representative from North Carolina who served in the Revolutionary War, was a delegate to the State constitutional convention in 1776, and served in the North Carolina State Senate from 1781-1782, and as a member of the North Carolina House of Commons from 1783-1792. In 1793, Matthew Locke was elected to the Third Congress and served until 1799. He died in 1801, in Salisbury, Rowan County, North Carolina.

Effiegene was born in Lockesburg, Sevier County, Arkansas, on April 13, 1883. She attended public and te schools, including Union Female College in Oxford, Mississippi. In 1895, Effiegene moved to Texarkana, Miller County, Arkansas, and then to De Queen in 1897. She graduated from Maddox Seminary in Little Rock, Pulaski County, Arkansas, in 1901.

On October 21, 1930, Effiegene was elected as a Democrat to the Seventy-first Congress to fill the vacancy caused by the death of her husband, Otis Theodore Wingo. On November 4, 1930, she was elected to the Seventy-second Congress and served from 4 November to 3 March 1933. Effiegene was the second woman from Arkansas to be elected to the United States Congress. She served as a member of the House of Representatives Foreign Affairs Committee. When Federal Relief Funds and Red Cross monies were unavailable for the people of Arkansas, Effiegene collected food, donations, and medicine from the wealthy in order to give to those affected by the Great Depression. She helped establish a Veterans Hospital and Federal Building in Texarkana, Miller County, as well as numerous railroad bridges, highways and levees. She also acquired welfare grants and loans for home and school construction for those in the Fourth Congressional District.

In 1934, she was the co-founder of the National Institute of Public Affairs in Washington, DC. She was a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the United Daughters of the Confederacy. Through the remainder of her life, she engaged in educational and research projects. On September 19, 196., Effiegene died in Burlington, Ontario, Canada, while visiting her son.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Otis Theodore and Effiegene Locke Wingo House is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with statewide significance under Criterion B for its association with United States Representatives Otis Theodore and Effiegene Locke Wingo.
