Summary

The Grand Army of the Republic Memorial of Judsonia is located in the north central section of Evergreen Cemetery in Judsonia, White County. Fabricated by the Morriss Brothers company in Memphis, it is a tall, vertical structure that is visually divided into three parts. The first section, the base, has a very rusticated face. Above this rests a tapered cube-like form, which contains the inscriptions. The third section is obelisk-like and gradually tapers at the top. This part contains two bands of rusticated stone at the top and bottom with relief sculptures in the center. The work is capped by a decorative globe with floral details. The base, made of fieldstone, has imensions of 11"x6'x6'. The obelisk sculpture, also made of stone, is 12'6"x4'x4'. The monument is located within a 31'-square low fieldstone boundary wall and contains several burials of Union veterans.

Elaboration

The east face of the monument is simply inscribed with "G. A. R." On the obelisk section is carved an eagle sitting on a sword and nine cannonballs, which rest on a five-pointed star.

The south face contains the inscription "ERECTED / BY / W. T. SHERMAN, / POST NO. 84. / G. A. R. / 1894." A relief sculpture of two crossed rifles is 'arved in the obelisk section.

On the west face is the inscription "IN MEMORY OF THE / DEFENDERS OF THE / UNION / 1861 - 1865." Carved in relief in the obelisk are two crossed

Confederate flags.

At the bottom of the north base is carved the foundry name, "MORRISS BROS. / MEMPHIS." This side also features a relief sculpture of two crossed swords.

he sculpture suffers from black crusts, organic growth, and sugaring. The base has organic growth and some chips are missing.

The monument lies within a 31'-square low fieldstone wall, which also surrounds the graves of several Union veterans, including soldiers from Indiana, Vermont, Tennessee, Ohio, Kentucky and Illinois. The wall and burials are included in this nomination.

White County's loyalties were divided during the Civil War. Although it organized seven companies of Confederate troops, its representative to the secession convention of 1861, J. N. Cypert, voted against leaving the Union and some residents actually went north to join the Yankee army. Support for the Federal cause continued during the postwar years, as the area's Northern veterans formed a thriving chapter of the G.A.R.

The Grand Army of the Republic Memorial of Judsonia was erected by the W. T. Sherman Post No. 84 of the G.A.R. in 1894. According to local historian W. E. Orr, it was the first Union monument to be built south of the Mason-Dixon The dedication ceremony, which took place in Evergreen Cemetery, was line. attended by both Confederate and Federal veterans and sympathizers and fostered unity between the former enemies rather than resentment or tension. The curtain was pulled by Ethel Newman and Carly Kinney, both daughters of Federal soldiers, and Nell Young and Laura Hanson, both daughters of Confederates. In the years following the dedication of the monument, 16 graves of G.A.R. veterans who lived in Judsonia after the war were added nearby.

As one of only three known monuments commemorating Union troops in Arkansas, and as the earliest of only two known G.A.R. monuments, it is eligible for listing with statewide significance.
